

The There is always tension in the presentation is given to every 6th grader in the school district. This encompasses eleven different school throughout the county and over 2230 students.

Students learn about the history of vaping, what is a drug, the effects of nicotine, the heath effects of vaping, why people vape, school and criminal consequence, ways to say "no" and a few case studies about vaping. Students will also get to take home a few gifts such as a wrist bracelet, stickers, magnets and pencils.

Prior to arriving at each schools comes hours of preparation. Its important to know how many 6th grade students attend each school and is the venue a small toa large auditorium. Power point projector and microphone has to be ready before students enter the room.

What is the SAFE Program?

The SAFE Program is a means for allowing better communication between Santa Rosa County
Emergency Responders and residents with special needs, or other disabilities, regarding critical information before an emergency occurs.

How does it work?

When residents enroll in this program, our dispatchers will input critical information into our system. This information will then be shared securely with other First Responders in the county. Should an emergency arise, the Sheriff's Office, EMS, Police, and Fire will have all the information that was provided to better keep residents safe.

Who should enroll?

This program is for all Santa Rosa County residents with a disability or special needs. Residents who might benefit from enrolling in the Safe Program Include:

Individuals with

- Autism
- Down syndrome
- Alzheimer's disease
- Deafness
- Blindness
- Other communication disorders
- Other mental disabilities/limitations.

How to enroll

Visit the Sheriff's Office website. Under the programs section, residents can find the SAFE Program. After downloading the form, email the completed form to Dispatch@SRSO.net
Please be sure to keep all information up to date.

After enrolling in the SAFE Program, residents may go to their local district office to receive 3 program decals. These decals will serve as an identifier to First Responders. Decals should be placed on the driver side rear window and a home
