One of the topics that frequently experience at middle schools is internet safety. With such a broad topic, there are several sub-categories to focus on. In the next upcoming issues, I will try to cover several of them. Today topic is "Sexting."

Sexting-the act of sending sexually explicit messages containing photo or videos between electronic devices. Sexual pictures and videos can be widely distributed. Once the image is sent, the sender no longer has control and can spread like a virus, hence we get the word, "viral."

Often sexting is a result of . peer pressure or is a result of an exchange for a commodity. For example, one student request sexual pictures of another, if this doesn't occur they will spread rumors about the victim. Or often occurs for an exchange agreement, such as a both students agree to send pictures of themselves. Lastly, the agreement can be made pictures for a commodity such as vaping, alcohol or drugs.

Please talk to your student and monitor their internet use. Here are some points to cover:

- Discuss the consequences of taking, sending, or forwarding a sexual picture. You can get kicked off of sports teams, face humiliation, lose educational opportunities, or face an investigation—possibly being charged with pornography.
- Never take photos of yourself that you wouldn't want everyone – your classmates, teachers, family, friends, and employer – to see.
- Before hitting send, remember that you can't control where this image may travel.
- If you forward a sexual image of someone without their consent, you are violating trust and exposing them to harm, and could possibly be facing legal consequences if an investigation occurs.
 - If anyone pressures you to send a sexual photo, don't give in and talk to an adult you trust. Anyone who tries to get you to do something you're not comfortable with is not trustworthy.
